## CHC30208 Certificate III in Aged Care

### What does the course involve?

This course is designed to equip students with the skills to provide physical and social support to elderly individuals and people with a physical and/or psychological disability in residential facilities.

With a strong practical focus, you will gain the skills required to become an assistant in nursing, community care worker, in-home respite worker or disability support officer. You will learn how to communicate appropriately with clients and colleagues, how to deliver the best service to clients and how to support group activities.

### What are my employment opportunities?

Graduates are able to work in the aged care industry, hospitals, in local government bodies, community organisations, Home and Community Care (HACC) services and health agencies.

### How long does it take?

The course duration is 14 weeks. The delivery mode involves 10 weeks of theoretical class delivery (three days per week) and 4 weeks of field placement.

### Field Placement

Field Placement forms an essential part of your competency-based assessment and provides you with practical job skills and work experience. There is one placement of up to 100 hours that the educator will assist you in organising. During the final 4 weeks, the educator then visits all students at their field placements to assess their competency.

### Entry requirements

Students must be competent in Literacy in order to fulfill course requirements. If you feel you have literacy needs that may impair your ability to work in this program please discuss this with an educator and an assessment interview can be arranged.

Students younger than 18 years must have parental/guardian approval.

### Support

Ongoing email and phone support is offered during the duration of the course.
